Through Good Friday, we'll be ii the Lenten worship series called "SEEING THE UNSEEN CHRIST: How His Presence Transforms Life." "JESUS' COMMAND: TO OBEY OR NOT TO OBEY?"

As soon as Judas left the room, Jesus said, "The time has come for the Son of Man to enter into his glory, and God will be glorified because of him. ³² And since God receives glory because of the Son, he will soon give glory to the Son. ³³ Dear children, I will be with you only a little longer. And as I told the Jewish leaders, you will search for me, but you can't come where I am going. ³⁴ So now I am giving you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, you should love each other. ³⁵ Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples." - John 13:31-35 (NLT)

Dear members & friends of Trinity UMC,

The month of April also brings us to Easter 2017—the end of the season of Lent. And, folks, if I had to boil the meaning of Easter down to one word, that word would be ... LOVE. It was the love of God that was at the heart of all that took place that first Holy Week and then into Easter. Only love could sacrifice one's own. Only love could send their very best to those who didn't deserve it. Only love could offer us a life—eternally—that would be better than we could even imagine!

Not to mix metaphors (or holidays), but I absolutely adore the Christmas hymn called 'Love Came Down at Christmas'. The final verse of that song (you've got the tune going through your head now, don't you?) is especially pertinent to the topic we're dealing with here. Let me remind you how that last verse goes:


Love shall be our token; love be yours and love be mine; Love to God and all [people], love for plea and gift and sign.

It strikes me that this Christmas hymn—especially this final verse—has everything to do with our scripture for this month, listed above. In this scripture, we hear Jesus speaking to his disciples—those who were left. It's the first Maundy or Holy Thursday. Jesus has dined with his disciples. Judas has just left the room to 'do what he had to do'. And Friday's coming, so Jesus gave those followers of his one last thing that he expected of them. He addresses them as 'Dear children' (or 'dear little children')—a very intimate greeting indeed. He lets them know that his end is near. So, because of that, he give them a new commandment: *Love each other*.

I think it's interesting, in verse 34, Jesus doesn't just give the disciples a 'tip' or a 'suggestion' for when he's gone. He's basically saying, 'This is what I expect of you after I'm gone.' And he knew (just like in any other relationship) that some days we wouldn't feel like loving one another. So Jesus gave us a command; he commanded us to behave in this way, if indeed we are followers of his! Why? Because ... this is our witness; this is the way we represent Jesus and his Church. And Jesus wants it no other way. He told us, 'Just as I have loved you, you should love each other.' He gave us a personal example—gave his life for us (and it doesn't get much more personal than that!).

Folks, LOVE is what Easter is really all about. And, as followers of Christ first and foremost, LOVE is what we're going to be all about, too. Here at TRINITY UMC, we're going to love God, and we're going to love one another. That's what TRINITY's going to be all about this Easter ... and forever. Won't you join me?

CHURCH MEMBER IN NEED OF ENCOURAGEMENT

I received an email a short time back from the daughter of one of our parishioners here at Trinity UMC. It seems that her parents are both going through some adjustments as the get older, so this is partly an update on the health of one of those parents. It is also an encouragement to you to be an encouragement to them at this time. Peggy Klein shares the following:

Your prayers for guidance will be appreciated for our family, as we embark upon the journey of life with Alzheimer's disease. In mid-November, Mom—Jane Klein—courageously expressed, to family, concerns of intermittent memory loss and a desire to pursue medical evaluation for this, after her knee replacement surgery scheduled for early December.

As reported to you in December, the knee replacement surgery was successful. After multiple tests for the memory concerns, Mom's medical providers diagnosed middle-stage Alzheimer's and vascular dementia. With this diagnosis, it is recommended that Mom live where assistance is available to her 24/7. So, she will continue to reside at Hillview Healthcare Center in La Crosse, where she had knee rehabilitation, and where Dad (Gordon) has been a resident for the past few years for assistance with physical limitations due to scoliosis and Parkinson's disease.

Encourage Someone Else With These Tips

Here are 10 starter ideas so that you can begin encouraging others right away.

- 1. Validate what someone has said or done. Validation is easy. A simple thumbs up "like" on a Facebook post is validating to others.
- 2. Smile. Your smile conveys warmth and acceptance. When we accept others we communicate that we think they are okay. That simple unspoken acceptance is encouraging.
- 3. Offer a listening ear. One of the greatest ways we can encourage others is by simply listening to what's on their mind or what's in their heart.
- 4. Offer a compliment or a word of praise. Be sure it's not superficial or a small talk nicety. Make it authentic and specific.
- 5. Notice that someone has made a difference. Connect the dots between what they did and what difference it made. By doing so, you will be adding purpose and meaning that is encouraging.
- 6. Appreciate what others have done. Express your gratitude, and don't assume others know it. You can't say "thank you" too often.
- 7. Give others the latitude to try new things. Part of encouraging others means boosting their confidence. By trusting others with new endeavors, you are demonstrating your confidence and building theirs. That's powerful encouragement!
- 8. Show an interest in what others are doing. Be curious and step outside your own comfort zone into someone else's. It is tremendously encouraging to know that others genuinely are interested in what you were doing.
- 9. Set and communicate your expectations. Be clear about what you expect. Let others surprise you as they arise to your expectations.
- 10. Encourage others by acknowledging the efforts they have made. Don't wait around for the end result. Encourage those efforts along the way if you'd like to see more of them.

Why is it a good idea to encourage others? The first and foremost reason to encourage others: it's the way it will make you feel, too.

That's right. When you encourage others, you will get an extra measure of courage that uplifts your spirit, too. Encouragement is contagious, and you can be the source.

"Be an encourager. The world has plenty of critics already."





What to watch for in "The Shack" United Methodist Pastors' Advice

"The Shack" opens in U.S. movie theaters this weekend, and even though the film is an adaptation of the controversial, <u>best-selling 2007 novel</u> written by Canadian author William P. Young, viewers can find comfort in the story, say United Methodist clergy. "The Shack' can be a powerful metaphor for understanding God's desire to offer us healing in times of trial, doubt, and unspeakable suffering," says the Rev. Matt Rawle, lead pastor at Asbury United Methodist Church in Bossier City, Louisiana.

In the film, Mack (portrayed by Sam Worthington) tries to recover from a deep grief resulting from a terrible tragedy in his family. This grief severely threatens Mack's faith, which is already on shaky ground after years of challenging God. Rawle is a firm believer that works such as *The Shack*, which integrate pop culture with Christian faith, can make Jesus more accessible and encourage discussions. "Although the film presents an unorthodox view of the Trinity, it would be shortsighted to see the story as heretical or blasphemous. In fact, using this cultural offering as a conversation starter may help those who are suffering find a language to share their grief and begin the healing process," says Rawle.

Rawle is referring to the controversy surrounding the author's (and film's) nonbiblical depiction of the Trinity: Papa, portrayed by African-American (and Academy Award-winning) actress Octavia Spencer; Jesus, portrayed by Avraham Aviv

Alush, an Israeli actor of Tunisian heritage; and Sarayu, the physical manifestation of the Holy Spirit, portrayed by Japanese actress Sumire Matsubara. "It's important to note that *The Shack* is not meant as a theological treatise, but rather a record of a journey to find healing from the worst tragedy that a parent can experience," says the Rev. Christy Thomas, a retired elder in The United Methodist Church. "It's best to view the movie through these eyes rather than through the eyes of 'I can tell you what God is actually about.' (The author) can't do that and neither can anyone else." One should watch the film "with an understanding that all language about and knowledge of God is necessarily limited and metaphorical. We humans don't have the ability to fully take in the Presence of God," says Thomas. "We can only describe it in words of our experiences. Those experiences are inevitably limited and interpretive."

"The way Young depicts the Trinity may look problematic, especially the use of a black female as "Papa," i.e., God the Father, but the Scriptures make it clear that the nature of God transcends gender classifications. For United Methodists, long comfortable with women in leadership, the more inclusive depiction of the Trinity really should not be an issue," she says. In hopes of fostering conversations, a number of United Methodist churches, such as Faith United Methodist Church in North Canton, Ohio, are inviting members to group screenings of the film. Led by Pastor Steve Stultz Costello, the church is renting an entire theater for one showing and handing out free tickets to church members and the community.

"Faith UMC believes God is at work in everyone's life guiding us on a journey into faith," says Rev. Costello. "We believe that the journey is assisted by questions – all kinds of questions. *The Shack*raises timeless questions about God and humanity through a story of tragic loss, grief, pain and healing." By watching the film together, says Costello, "we believe God will be present and with God comes the hope of new beginnings, movement on our faith journey, even new life." This sentiment is also present in the lyrics of the title song "Keep Your Eyes on Me," sung by Tim McGraw, who also stars in the feature, and his wife Faith Hill. The song was written by McGraw, Hill, Shane McAnally, and Lori McKenna, the songwriter who wrote the Grammy-winning "Humble and Kind," also sung by McGraw. McGraw told CMT.com that the song captures "the spirit and soul of what the film was saying. There's a part where that line is spoken," he explains, "and it was so powerful, and we took that and ran with it."

The final refrain is inspiring throughout the entire church year, but especially here at the beginning of Lent:

Keep your eyes on me...When you're lost in the dark...Keep your eyes on me...When the light in your heart is

Too burned out to see...Keep your eyes on me...Keep your eyes on me.


