#### UPDATE ON THE FUTURE OF THE UMC

Your word is a lamp to guide my feet and a light for my path. – Psalm 119:105 (NLT)

Dear Trinity family,

As promised before Easter, this month's newsletter is a short update on the future of the United Methodist Church—after the Judicial Council (Supreme Court) of the United Methodist Church met to determine what was constitutional or not, regarding all that was voted on at the special General Conference back in February. Following is a simple update I received from the Rev. Keith Boyette, President of the Wesleyan Covenant Association (and an attorney by trade), that will offer a general update. (For more detailed updates, please look online.) Again, here is the update I received immediately after the Judicial Council concluded on Friday, April 26<sup>th</sup>:

...the Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church issued two significant decisions today.

In Decision 1378, the Council held that a significant portion of the Traditional Plan is constitutional and that that portion is severable from those portions that were previously determined to be unconstitutional. Thus, the constitutional portions will go into effect on January 1, 2020.

In Decision <u>1379</u>, the Council held that the legislation adopted providing a pathway for local churches to exit from the UM Church with their property upon satisfying several steps is constitutional. This pathway is immediately available to churches.

In other words, the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church (church law) has been upheld. We will continue to keep scripture as our primary (Wesleyan) means of knowing God & doing church and will operate accordingly. With temporary legislation (Decision 1379 above) in place that suspends the Trust Clause through December 2021 (the law that says all property returns to the Conference Board of Trustees should a United Methodist Church decide to withdraw from the UMC), this will allow churches not willing to abide by the decisions of the United Methodist Church—the General Conference, as well as our Judicial Council—a way forward. This legislation allows for a gracious and respectful exit for any local churches or Conferences desiring to do so.

As your pastor, I will be keeping the leadership of the church (Church Council) updated as time goes on. We, in turn, will keep you as a congregation updated. There is no doubt there will be changes happening soon that will affect the United Methodist Church as a whole, our Annual Conference, and our local church. Again, there are more detailed updates online for those wishing to read a more in-depth analysis of recent events. Thanks for your patience and love in this process of our denomination. My prayer is that we can just continue being Trinity UMC—a beacon of light for all wishing to explore a relationship with God through Jesus Christ. Pray that with me, will you? In ministry together,

#### "Till the Storm Passes Over"

An old radio program called the Big Story was about a reporter and the big story he wrote about. Opening lines: This is the big Story as the reporter lived and wrote. So too is the story of storms that my parents lived through and told me about as I was over a hundred miles away in Oconto when the storm happened. Two things came to mind when discussing storms. First the Biblical story of Jesus calming the storm of the Sea of Galilee and second is the hymn "Till the Storm Passes By". We, in Wisconsin are subject to great many storms: severe thunderstorms, high windstorms and tornados, driving rains, winter storms like snowstorms, sleet and blizzards. We also know that there are no hiding places from the storm, but we realize that there really is a hiding place: the arms of Jesus. Now to a storm story...

It was a very hot and humid day and the weather man had predicted strong thunder storms and possible tornados. My dad and brother came in from the outside and told my mother that the sky looked terrible with rolling clouds and far off rumbles of thunder. Mom looked out the west kitchen window to see what they were talking about and to her horror saw three funnel clouds coming down and marching towards the farm. At that very moment the storm sirens went off in Lomira, Campbellsport and Eden. They gathered the flashlights and blankets and headed for the basement. The cellar had only two quarter windows to the east so they were unable to see the storm.

They were in the dark so to speak and soon the electricity failed. Not able to see the storm's approach, they could only listen to the roar of the wind, the clashes of thunder, the pelting of rain, the shuddering of the house in the wind and through the small windows the continuous lightning. In this atmosphere, they began to speculate what was happening and the destruction taking place. As you might imagine, they thought of the worse: were the farm buildings being destroyed, were the animals being killed, would the house collapse and trap them in the cellar? She said it was a trying time of doubts and confusion and as the hymn mentions in times like this: "Satan would whisper that there is no need

to cry, there is no end to the sorrow and no hope in the by and by." But they knew Jesus was in the cellar with them and prayed Precious Lord keep us safe till the storm passes over.

And the storm did pass over and they were able to come up from the basement. They really didn't know what to expect when they looked outside and what they saw wasn't what they imagined. There was damage and yet there were the unexplained. The northern most tornado veered further north and wiped out a great number of trees along the fence line. The middle tornado completely destroyed the large pole barn and took off the top of the cement silo. The unexplained was that the silo was attached to the main barn and the pole barn was only a couple of yards west of the barn, which was untouched, save a few shingles. The twelve telephone -type poles anchored six feet in the ground to support the structure were pulled from the earth and strewn somewhere. We found two half pulled out and another in the field. The location of the other nine as well as the aluminum siding and roof were never located-perhaps in the wooded areas to the east. The southern one skirted the garage but completely uprooted and moved several yards a very large willow tree. That tree grew about ten feet from the garage and about thirty feet from the house. That there was damage, what was saved is almost miraculous and not one animal was lost. Truly, their prayers were answered.

Again, the hymn says it all:

"Till the storm passes over, till the thunder sounds no more, till the clouds roll forever from the sky. Oh Lord let me stand in the hollow of Thy hand and keep me safe till the storm passes over." And my favorite line: "I know that Jesus is with me and tomorrow I rise to where no storm clouds darken the sky." Yes, indeed, Christ is our hiding place when storms happen and contrary to what Satan may say, hope springs eternal and God will answer our cries for his help. What an awesome God we serve and thanks to the hymn writer for such a comforting song.

We will encounter many storms and we will know the hiding place.

- 6. Submit to a background check.

We are looking for both men and women to serve as caring ministers. Our preference is to have a male care giver visit a male care receiver and a female visit a female.

#### **CHURCH COUNCIL DEFINES 'ACTIVE MEMBER'!**

Have you ever heard the term 'active member'—referring to an individual's current activity level in their church? When we join a local church—as a member, we make promises to be active in the local church in several ways. But, what does 'active member' really mean? Has it ever been defined? If it hasn't, there is no way to measure if someone is 'active' in their local church—fulfilling their membership vows—or not.

At the most recent Church Council meeting, the leadership of Trinity UMC voted to define what 'active member' will mean here at Trinity. It has been determined, for now, that the *minimum* requirement to be considered an active member of Trinity UMC is that *each member will be in worship at Trinity UMC no less than 50% of the time* throughout the year. Opportunities to worship are, of course, 52 weekends of the year (Sundays), as well as special times of the year like Christmas Eve services and Holy Week services (i.e. Maundy Thursday & Good Friday). This guideline for the future of our local church membership is effective immediately and may be revisited and updated as time goes on.




