Dear Trinity family,



This month, we begin a series of newsletter messages about membership. What does it mean to be a member of a United Methodist Church?

To be up front with you, membership was the topic of my doctoral thesis. It's an area of ministry I care a great deal about and have some understanding of. For me, membership should equal discipleship—that simple. When the leaders of Trinity UMC set a standard for membership regarding worship attendance a few short weeks ago, they were simply being good leaders regarding membership in the local church. They care about individual's walks with God, too. And, practically speaking, as that great business leader Peter Drucker once said, "What gets measured improves." My desire, as your pastor and spiritual 'coach' is for you to be the very best disciple of Jesus Christ you can be!

When we take our membership vows—becoming an official member of the local church, we make *eternal* promises before the church and God. One of those promises is ... *to be present*. Setting a healthy goal for all members 'to be present' is exactly what our church leadership should be doing. I, for one, am very proud of this group of leaders.

Let me review our membership vows with you, since we're going to be spending some time in this area. When we became (or become) members, we made (7) promises (¶ 217, BOD)...

- 1)To renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness, reject the evil powers of the world, and repent of our sin;
- 2)To accept the freedom and power God gives us to resist evil, injustice, and oppression;
- 3)To confess Jesus Christ as Savior, putting our whole trust in his grace, and promising to serve him as our Lord;
- 4)To remain faithful members of Christ's holy church and serve as Christ's representatives in the world;
- 5)To by loyal to Christ through The United Methodist Church and do all in our power to strengthen its ministries;
- 6)To faithfully participate in its ministries by our prayers, *our presence*, our gifts, our service, and our witness;
- 7)To receive and profess the Christian faith as contained in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments.

These are the vows all members take. Make special note of the part of promise #6 that talks about participation by 'our presence.' That's why the leadership of Trinity UMC has

set a policy for minimum activity as a member (and *it is* just a 'minimum' expectation). This is, of course, for those who live locally, are not 'shut in' (a part of our Caring Ministry program), or who have regularly scheduled work hours on Sunday mornings. This is for the many members of our local church who need a 'nudge' when it comes to following through with their membership vows—not neglecting our meeting together' as the writer of Hebrews puts it.

We'll cover the other parts of our membership vows in the months to come. But let me ask these questions as I close: Why wouldn't we want to be the very best church—Body of Christ—we could be? Why wouldn't you want to be the very best disciple (member) you could be, especially after all Jesus has done for you (Easter=given you the gift of life)? Those are the questions that now need to be pondered. Let's get fired up for the future God has for us, folks! And let's be a 'winning' church for Christ!



The Essay...

I happened to be watching and listening to Jake Hess's moving rendition of the hymn called: I Met the Master. A version can be seen on the Gaither Homecoming series. That soul searching song got me thinking about how my life changed when I met Jesus. I developed an overwhelming desire to serve the Lord, which was accompanied with feelings of calm, contentment, love and relief in knowing that I was saved and my sins pardoned. No wonder I was attracted to Fanny Crosby's hymn: Blessed Assurance. Her words speak far better than mine of my meeting Jesus. She wrote: "Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine. O what a foretaste of glory divine. Heir of salvation, purchased by God, Born of his spirit, washed in His blood. Perfect submission, perfect delight. Visions of rapture now burst on my sight. Angels descending, bring from above echoes of mercy, whispers of love. Perfect submission, all is at rest. I in my Savior am happy and blest. Watching and waiting, looking above, Filled with his goodness, lost in His love. This is my story, this is my song: Praising my savior all the day long."

Oh what a glorious hymn and how eloquently it describes one meeting Jesus. These are meeting that changes one's life and direction. Nothing can compare with truly meeting our Savior. Meeting our parents, siblings, relatives and close friends are significant and life altering. We will meet a great many others on our earthly sojourn and I don't think they all are by chance, for I believe God places people for us to meet because the meeting results in change, new feelings and new directions. These meetings are the basis for this article.

As a teacher for over three decades, I had the



opportunity to meet thousands of students and their parents. While all these meetings were important and there were many memorable students, only a few hunting, talking on the phone and so forth. But that rose to the occasion of producing changes in direction and attitudes about teaching. These students crossed from Dorothy. my path and in doing so made me a better teacher and person. Since God has a plan for each of us, it is natural to believe he ordains that we meet special people. This is a story about one of them.

I received my education as a teacher at the University of Wisconsin, Madison where I studied under the eminent professor of education Emlyn Jones. The fact that I chose teaching as a career was due to a grade school teacher, but that's another story. When I got my degree, I believed I knew everything and with that feeling, I took a teaching position with Oconto Public Schools. This was the early 1960's and was assigned to teach all Freshman Social Studies. All courses were a year long and included all freshman save those who were blind or deaf, or had severe learning limits, all others were included. I had developed a reputation of rigidity in demands as well as not checking on their Junior High records, I believed that each student could feel they could have a new start. Yet, I needed to know something about my incoming students and I wanted them to tell me about themselves.

To achieve this end, I devises a questionnaire for them to complete at the end of eight grade. Two questions were important to me: First they were to list two things they liked and disliked about school: Second they were to list two strengths, and weaknesses they had as a student. Finally, I asked them to write a short biographical sketch of themselves. These questionnaires lay upon my desk until August when I read and evaluated each one. The essays were especially important because it offered me the chance to observe their writing skills, vocabulary and habits. I must admit that most were mundanely similar. My name is, I'm 13 or 14 years

old, I have x number of brothers and sisters, I live in the city or rural area, I like to do certain things _ i.e. particular year I happened to read a very short essay

Her essay consisted of four sentences which I will always remember. These were from a young girl thirteen years old, who's words left me wondering if she was sincere or just putting me on. These were the exact four sentences Dorothy wrote: "I am a witch. I was born an alien to my family and race. I can never hope to love or be loved. I want to build a house in the woods and live there with my animals."

What would you think had you read an essay like that? Like the old weekly radio shows, tune in next week to hear the conclusion of this story. So that's where we will leave it until next time when you will learn about Dorothy and her essay.

I would also like to take the opportunity to suggest a few Faith based movies that address these special meetings. First is "To Save a Life", it was a church project to make this movie which is about suicide, teen pregnancy, teen drug use and how one teen meets Jews and alters his life, his family and his school. Well worth watching but parent guidance is needed if shown to young people. Another is "New Hope". It's about a minister's relocation and his son's meeting new people and making new friends. He meets the brother of a teen who committed suicide and how this conflictual relationship is solved. The next is "WWJD" (What Would Jesus Do) about a stranger's impact on the people of the community and a minister about to leave the church after an automobile accident claimed his wife and child. Finally "WWJDII, The Woodcarver", which is about a young boy who vandalizes the church and meets the man who carved the wooden trimming and how that meeting alters his life and the life of his family. At last animals can impact lives, see "Hachi" about a faithful dog. It's an uplifting story and a real tearjerker.



Gwen Again

Yes, it's a voice from the past ...almost two years past and I miss you beautiful souls, your inspiring music, your sacred worship, your able leadership, your warm support and friendship and much more.

Last Sunday, there were 14 women and 3 men in attendance at our ecumenical Christian church service. One of the men was the part-time pianist who led our singing on a tiny spinet piano, another was the minister, and the third was the lone male in the "congregation". We sit on chairs, set up for the occasion, in 5 rows of five across and sing from the very same hymnal that you do. Two of us sing from memory, not seeing well enough to read. Four women are in wheelchairs and two of chm read scripture and serve communion which is offered every Sunday. We sound like a sorry bunch, but in fact, we have a sanctuary more inspiring than the cathedrals. The entire length of the west wall is clear glass windows. We are on the 14th floor. The turbulent city below is silenced and invisible from our eagle's nest, replaced by a view of magnificent snow-capped mountains stretching to the north and south as far as one can see while blue sky and wispy white clouds stretch on toward infinity. It's my great fortune and sacred privilege to worship in this sanctuary alone or in a group, any day and any hour.

One would think, by my lack of responsibility here, that I spend my days watching TV and munching on chocolates. In truth, however, I have only a few channels available to me (mostly re-runs of old shows) and as for chocolates, I'm still "saving" a Hershey's Kiss given to me in February. So what do I do? Six hours of every week I am in either Physical or Occupational Therapy (offered right here on the top floor with the same view I described above) On the days that I don't have therapy I'm expected to exercise in my apartment I eat three good meals a day in the dining room with about thirty of my new friends. I attend planned classes or activities in small groups. I walk outside when the weather beckons me and sometimes inside along the many long hallways when it doesn't. I read books of my choice, or rather have them read to me on my wonderful "player" from the National Library Service for the Blind (1-888-657-7323). I love sitting at the computer and writing to those who have made my life full and meaningful...like you.

Yes, I'm comfortable and happy here and although separated from Ward and Jeanne by about 30 minutes (a distance Ward often travels to visit or to help me) I am content and grateful. There is, however, something I truly miss Yes, I miss my many faithful and thoughtful friends in Lomira, but there is also something else only partially compensated by the view of these majestic and solid and inspiring mountains. That would be the sunsets framed by my west window on Grove St. where, so frequently, I would stand and worship, often with tears of wonder and awe spilling over. Perhaps it is the distance and huge expanse of sky or the "thin" air here, or the wind patterns or something else, but my apartment faces west and the closest to a sunset that I've seen in two years is a deeper blue sky than in WI and some broad strips of light pink stretching across the blue. Where are those almost shocking colors and mixed subtle hues that totally fill the sky, silhouetting the trees against them that inspire awe, gratitude, and worship? Not in this part of Colorado.

I have no story or incident to include today. Perhaps I will go that route next time in a few months. It feels so good to be connecting with you. God <u>IS</u> within you.
