"In his grace, *God has given us different gifts for doing certain things well* [italics mine]. So if God has given you the ability to prophesy, speak out with as much faith as God has given you.⁷ If your gift is serving others, serve them well. If you are a teacher, teach well.⁸ If your gift is to encourage others, be encouraging. *If it is giving, give generously* [italics mine]. If God has given you leadership ability, take the responsibility seriously. And if you have a gift for showing kindness to others, do it gladly." – Romans 12:6-8 (NLT)

Dear Trinity family,

It's hard to believe that summer '19 has come and almost gone, by the time you read this! It's been a good summer on my end, however, and I hope & pray it's been good on yours too. It is September though. School has begun and many are underway in their life schedules into this new school year. Here at Trinity, we're gearing up for a great school year as well.

A few months back, we implemented a new goal for our members to reach—50% worship attendance (for those who are physically able to be here). And out of that discussion, I've been teaching/reminding on what it means to be a member of a local United Methodist congregation. Though there are many ways we measure membership, weekly attendance at one of our worship celebrations is the most outward sign of who our members are—what they do together. So, I've been teaching/reminding about membership. Let's continue in that 6th promise we make as members—*what we promise to participate in when we become members*.

I think we've covered the importance/reasons for making regular worship attendance a priority—the first of the participatory promises. This month, I want to begin talking about the second participatory promise—our gifts. And, as United Methodists, we have a two-fold understanding of what this means. 1) It's about sharing our *spiritual gifts* with the local Body of Christ. (We take our membership vows in community & promise to live them out in community.) And 2) it's about sharing *tangible (financial) gifts* with the local Body of Christ so it can function and be all God wants it to be (through various ministries) in this world we live in.

So how are you doing with this part of your membership vows? In general, all these membership vows express God's call to discipleship. God bids us to fulfill that calling wherever we go, whatever we do. Just like our founding father, John Wesley, we believe 'the world is our parish,' which means our discipleship is to be lived out wherever we go, whatever we do. The local church, however—and our membership here, is where we practice these beliefs. If you're connected to Trinity UMC through membership, this is where we live out the vows we made in this community and before God. So, are you sharing your gifts with your church?

I'll continue with this particular part of our membership vows in October, but let me next say that in October/November we will be offering another Membership Class here at Trinity UMC! This is a six-week class for anyone wanting to know more about membership—either those currently a member or those desiring to be a member. Again, this will start in October; this is your chance to discover (if you haven't already) what the United Methodist Church expects of its members, along with what your pastor expects of those who connect to Trinity UMC through membership. And this is *a class of exploration*, so feel free to sign up on the sign-up sheet in the Connections Room and join us. We'd love to have you a part of this very informative class—again, only six weeks this fall. Until next month, we're...

CEMETERY ASSOCIATION ANNOUNCES PRICE INCREASE

The Trinity Cemetery Association has announced an increase in the cost of purchasing cemetery lots at all three of the locations. Increased costs of perpetual care and maintenance are the primary reasons for the need. New prices will become effective as of January 1, 2020:

For members of Trinity Church, lot prices will be increased to \$500.00 per lot from the current \$300.00. Perpetual care will be increased to \$500.00 per person from the current \$300.00.

Trust

There are many experiences that I had as a teacher. The one I chose to relate is about trust. Trust came up in one of Rom's sermons and is a tenant of our faith. I had a class of 23 Seniors in my Sociology/Social Problems class. This happened in the sixties when all classes were a year long as we had not arrived at the semester concept. During the course of the year a very special bond developed between teacher and students and between students. This bond grew into real trust as each class member felt at ease in the class. Because we discussed life's problems, the students agreed to keep what was said in the class in the room and not tell outside the class. They themselves came to this so-called rule because they would often relate personal experiences that befit the topic under discussion.

The subject of trust came up about midway through the year. Because the class had developed a unity, one student asked me if I trusted them. I replied in affirmative. Little did I know that with this response, I would be put to the test. They asked how I could demonstrate this trust in them. I asked time to consider what I could do. The next day I said the following –“Do you trust me?” and they said yes. After all they said we trust you to teach us what we need and you will grade us fairly and honestly. Anyway, I thought of something that I thought they would never do. I said I would leave the classroom for ten minutes and go to the office and to prove it I used the intercom from the office. They were to place on the table anything that illegal or against

school rules to have in their possessions.

During the ten minutes, I really believed that when I returned to the classroom that the table would be empty. I was anxious to demonstrate that trust can be limited. However, when I returned the table was not empty but full of many things. I thought to myself, how could 23 seniors carry with them so much? What was on the table: packs of cigarettes, decks of playing cards, a switch blade, jack knives, lewd pictures, bongos or drub pipes and various pills (of which I did not know). The class seeing my astonishment beamed in the fact they demonstrated their trust in me.

I now faced a real dilemma. By rights, I was to confiscate the items and report it to the office. But I also realized that they trusted me (I chose the wrong way to demonstrate it) and if I did confiscate, I would lose their trust and the class for the rest of the year. I reiterated my dilemma to them- they understood and vowed that no one outside the class would ever know. I then said I would leave the room for ten minutes and they could collect their items. They said no, they did not want me to leave the room and that I could see who placed what items on the table. I was overwhelmed in the fact that they had this much trust in me. They came up one by one and reclaimed their items and nothing was ever said to anyone. I was glad it was over, but it did make me think about the ramifications of trust and the responsibility that it places on the people doing the trusting and the person they trusted.

It was an experience I will never forget to feel so trusted by a group of students. Trust is vital to our lives. What would it be like if we could not trust another person? I thought about who I trusted besides my family and close friends. There are the doctors (when I had my latest heart attack, I vaguely remember the doctors and nurses telling me to stay with them as I lapsed in and out of consciousness). In the flurry of taking x-rays, drawing blood for tests, placing IV's in my arms, giving shots of morphing, I had to place my trust in them and that they would do their best to see me through, which they did- I'm writing this article. Later the cardiologist told me what I would need to do to prevent a future attack or stroke.

I thought of the hymn: Trust and Obey. I looked up the song in our hymnal and was attracted to the second verse. "Not a shadow can rise, not a cloud in the skies, but His smile quickly drives it away. Not a doubt, nor a fear, not a sigh nor a tear can abide while we trust and obey. Trust and obey for there is no other way. To be happy in Jesus, but to trust and obey." I love that verse as it really demonstrates the need for trust. Life without trust would be chaotic. Driving down the road you have to trust that the other driver is following the rules of the road. There are many other examples.

The pinnacle of trust is that which we place in Jesus-that trust is implicit. There are times when trust is challenged. Time like why do I have this particular disease, like mass killings at El Paso and other tragedies in our life or in the lives of others. But because of our faith (not being able to see or understand God's full plan) we are able to retain that trust. It is that in the lord that allows us to endure and to face tomorrow.

So we trust and obey for there is no other way. Think of all the people you trust and all the people who trust you. To list those I trust: parents, family, close friends, my pastor, my church family and of course, my Lord and others. With the exception of my Savior, sometimes trust in others can be shaken, misplaced or lost, but the unshakeable trust in the lord allows us to go. There is so much more about trust that needs to be said, perhaps in a future article.

Your donation also provides The Greatest Gift Gospel Booklets, which are written in the children's language and distributed along with shoebox gifts.



Caring Ministry

The purpose of Trinity's Caring Ministry is to offer distinctively Christian caregiving to those who are a part of Christ's body, but are homebound to the point of not being able to worship with us regularly. Caring ministers visit "shut in" church members once a month for approximately an hour. During the visits we administer communion, talk about the ongoing activities of the church, pray together, and discuss topics of interest to the care receiver.

We have fielded requests to provide additional services to our homebound or assisted living members. We wish that we could do more but our ministry operates to the extent described in the preceding paragraph.

On communion Sunday after communion has been distributed to the congregation you have noticed one of the caring ministers walk to the communion table. The congregation reads a blessing and the caring minister walks down the center aisle with two containers. The dish contains communion wafers, not cubed bread, and the vinegar jar contains grape juice. These elements have been blessed by Pastor Rom. After church the communion stewards prepare 7 small communion kits with a container of grape juice and a few wafers. The caring ministers pick up their filled communion kit and try to visit their care receiver sometime during that next week. During that visit the caring minister follows a short scripted communion service and celebrates communion with their care receiver. The caring minister is responsible for getting their cleaned communion kit back to church before communion Sunday the following month.

New to the caring ministry team for the 2019-2020 season is Carol Dilling. Carol was trained over the summer and she will be commissioned into caring ministry on September 15. Carol joins the returning caring ministry team that includes: Ruth Batterman, Kathy Drexler, Dorothy Hake, Gene Hake, Betty Menzer, Chuck Rhein, Bill Seefeld, and Deb Wiedmeyer. If you have interest in learning more about Trinity's Caring Ministry please contact Kathy Drexler, coordinator. We will be thrilled to train new team members again in June and July 2020.

I hope you have all enjoyed a safe and fun summer, as I have. As you may know, our Choir Season is fast approaching and I'm looking at some new and old favorite songs for us to enjoy and sing.

Our practices again will be held on Wednesday nights, starting at 7:00 pm, we will be singing the 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month. The Choir is always looking for some new adult members to join our festive group. You need to be a Freshman in high school, or older, to be part of the Adult Choir. Come check us out any Wednesday night and join in the fun of singing to the lord.

Our first practice of this new season will be on Wednesday, September 11th at 7:00 pm. We will be singing on Sunday, September 15th, at the 10:00am service. See you soon!

Little Things CAN Mean a Lot!!



A community service project started during Vacation Bible School in 2014, continues to support a worthy cause – the **Ronald McDonald House** of Eastern Wisconsin.

On Saturday, May 18th, Owen, Amy and Steve Unferth traveled to Winter Services in Milwaukee to participate in the annual Ronald McDonald House Pop Tab Dump Day. Their cargo consisted of 480 pounds of pop tabs!!!

Recycling pop tabs can provide a surprising amount of revenue to help fund the RMH “home away from home” for families with sick children being treated at local hospitals.

Since 2000, recycling little aluminum tabs on the tops of soda cans has generated over \$360,000 for the Ronald McDonald House.

Savings pop tabs is easy! They’re compact, with a high concentration of recyclable aluminum. This year, a TOTAL of over 7,000 pounds of tabs were collected in Milwaukee, generating over \$8,000!!

How can you help? Spread the word to your family, friends, classmates and co-workers and provide containers (located on the filing cabinets in the hallway near the church offices) for them to collect pop tabs. When the containers are full, dump them into the RMH House located at the church – and keep on collecting - it’s that simple! Let’s continue to **PULL TOGETHER** for the kids!
