- December 24 "Love All!" Matthew 25:31-46 (ONLINE ONLY)

We will continue offering two forms of worship for the season of Advent for the four Sundays leading up to Christmas Eve—9 AM for both parking lot (FM 87.9) and online. Then, on both Christmas Eve & Sunday, December 27, we will be ONLINE ONLY! Not knowing where we will be at regarding the coronavirus pandemic, along with the complexity of what we want to do for Christmas Eve and the final Sunday of the year (and the fact we have to plan all of this about a month early), we have decided to keep these two services to ONLINE ONLY. We are planning one of our best Christmas Eve services ever, so make sure you have your candles ready to light!

Dear Trinity,

As we ended our November worship series, we finished with some thoughts from Paul's 'Thank You Note' to the church at Philippi. In the above verses, Paul is encouraging those in the church *not* to act like the world. Instead, he is encouraging them to act like Jesus—'Christ-like' if you will. And that is certainly my admonition to you this Advent. Never has there been a time in my life when 'what's really on the inside' of people is 'reflected so clearly on the outside,' as we continue to grind through this pandemic season ... which now encompasses the season of Jesus' birth. This reminder comes almost daily as technology is sometimes used as a weapon to kill the spirit of those on the receiving end by venting of how things are, how they want them to be, and letting others know in no uncertain terms that consideration for 'what they want' should be prioritized above everyone else, their health & safety, and so forth. But is that what God's word says?

Long ago in a faraway village, there was a place called the House of 1,000 Mirrors. A small, happy dog learned of this placed and decided to visit. On arrival, he bounced up the stairs to the doorway of the house. To his great surprise, he found himself staring at 1,000 other small, happy dogs with their tails wagging just as fast as his. He smiled a friendly smile and was answered with 1,000 smiles just as friendly. As he left the house, he thought to himself, 'This is a wonderful place. I will come back and visit it often.' Meanwhile, another small dog, who was not as happy as the first one, decided to visit the house. He slowly climbed the stairs and hung his head low as he looked into the door. When he saw 1,000 unfriendly dogs staring back at him, he growled at them and was horrified to see 1,000 small dogs growling back at him. As he left, he thought to himself, 'That is a horrible place. I will never go back there again.'

No, Advent 2020 is probably not going to be like Advents past. No, we're not going to be able to physically participate in some of the traditions Trinity has known in years past—at least, not like we want to (though new traditions are being born at this time). But ... how we see the realities of this season, and how others see the reality of this season, will depend a great deal on the attitudes of our heart. Will we heed the Apostle Paul's words to the church at Philippi as we move through this season (not just Advent, but the pandemic we're in)? Will we 'think of others [all others] as better than ourselves' and treat them like it? Because that'll be our witness to the world. Will it be Christ-like? "You must have the same attitude that Christ Jesus had," Paul reminds us.

I think an appropriate prayer as we work together through this Advent season—one that would be Godly as well as helpful—would be this: "Lord, help us—in spite of ourselves—to be a reflection of *Your love for us* during this season, as we celebrate the birth of Your Son, and remember the incredible, undeserved love behind his life. Amen."

Working together to be the Body of Christ [especially] this Christmas, *Pastor Rom*

P.S. Amid heightened emotions during this pandemic, the majority of those I encounter are incredibly positive, supportive, and Christ-like. FYI.

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matthew 6:19-21)

Is **Giving Wholeheartedly** a minor stewardship theme OR, is it the whole point of being a follower of Christ? **Is giving wholeheartedly** the essential to having a relationship with the Creator? Is **presenting our gifts to God** not just an important part of Sabbath worship, but is it the <u>central and most important part</u> and the true reason for our worship?

"Giving Wholeheartedly means committing ourselves entirely to the mission and ministry exemplified by the life of Jesus Christ. This means that every bit of time, every bit talent and every bit of treasure, even that which we spend on ourselves and our families, is for God's purpose.

"Giving Wholeheartedly means that when our hearts are open, our arms are open as well. When we are practicing our discipleship, we are sharing the love and grace with our neighbors near and far. We live out our love by reaching out to those in need, for example, Ruby's Pantry food distribution that served 380 families and individuals this week.

"Finally, **Giving Wholeheartedly** means a willingness to give to the church so that whatever ministry unfolds, it is funded. **Giving wholeheartedly** provides opportunities for our local churches to be ready, willing and available to serve in whatever manner Christ calls us to serve." What we can conclude from this is that you need to give for your own spiritual benefit. Not selfishly because it makes you feel good, but because it fulfills your need to be a faithful follower of Christ.

CARES Act Promotes Charitable
Contributions

Helps for the Stewardship Team the *Coronavirus Aid*, *Relief*, *and Economic Security Act* (H.R. 748), known as the

A WAY OF LIVING

(Continued)

CARES Act, was enacted in March 2020. Certain provisions were included to make it easier for individuals to give to churches and other charitable organizations. Below is a summary provided by Wespath Benefits and Investments (1). Please share it with your congregation as soon as possible:

The **CARES Act** encourages individuals, families, and corporations to continue to contribute to churches and other charitable organizations.

Allowance of Partial Above-the-Line Deduction for Charitable Contributions

Section 2204 of the Act permits taxpayers to deduct up to \$300 of cash contributions, whether they itemize their deductions or not. It creates a new "above-the-line" deduction for all taxpayers who contribute to religious, charitable and educational organizations (i.e., for taxpayers who take the standard deduction). This deduction will permit these taxpayers to deduct up to \$300 of annual monetary contributions. This is applicable for tax years beginning after 2019, and does not sunset after 2020 like the increased limits described below.

Modification of Limitations on Charitable Contributions during 2020

Section 2205 of CARES increases the limitations on deductions for charitable contributions by individuals who itemize, as well as corporations. Such cash contributions must be made during 2020. This provision does not extend the due date of the 2020 tax return. For individuals, the 50%-of-adjusted-gross-income limitation is suspended for 2020. [That is, you may claim charitable contributions up to 100% of adjusted-gross-income.]

Why Can't I go to Church??!!

I don't know about you but I'm frustrated; along with disappointed and even a little bit angry that I can't attend in person worship at Trinity. One would think that all this stuff that we are doing should end this stupid virus. Can't we all go back to the way things were before? Can't the leadership figure out a way to let us back in? Other churches are holding in person services, why can't we do the same? As I listen to people around the area I know that goodly numbers of others feel the same way. This all makes sense so we should demand that we meet in person.

There's only one problem. The virus **isn't** going away. The number of new cases keeps increasing each week. I'm writing this on November 19. Earlier this week we set a new record high for Wisconsin, almost 8,000 in a single day. Who knows what it will be when you read this. This week I've found out that some dozen or so people that I know have caught covid. It used to be that I knew of just one person who had it. Another problem with covid is how uneven its effects are. I have a friend, Marv, who has been infected. They tested his entire family. 2 of his granddaughters along with his son also contracted covid. The grandchildren had no symptoms at all. The son had a mild case of the flu, but Marv has been down with it for 3 weeks now. He has gone to the emergency room twice, but they won't admit him because they are getting short of beds and they want to save the few open beds that they have for people who are in tougher shape than Marv. Our own members Syd and Tom Henke also caught covid and have had a similar experience. Tom had milder symptoms, but he was still sick for an entire month. Syd's symptoms were much more serious. She had 2 hospital stays and was very weak and is just now slowly recovering.

So has our church leadership been too cautious in opening up? Maybe, but the consequences of being wrong might land some of our members or one of their family members in the hospital, or even worse. So that's the rub, if we open up we run the risk of infecting one of our own. Would you want it on your conscience that our actions have caused harm, possibly great harm to someone that we worship with and love? Also, many of the churches that have opened up are experiencing Covid issues and some have since closed. My friend Marv has told me that as poorly as he feels, his worst fear is that he might have spread the disease to someone else. He said "I couldn't bear knowing that I have caused harm to another by giving them covid."

So what should we do? There really is no clear cut answer. As for me, I will try to stay as safe as possible for the next couple of months. I will limit my outside contacts and definitely stay away from large gatherings. Unfortunately that includes church. I will still celebrate Christmas though, but it will be different this time. Instead of parties and personal visits, there will be phone calls and Christmas Cards, lots of them. The one thing we need to remember is that this **will** come to an end, just not when we want it too. And when it does, oh what a joy that will be.

The Birth of Jesus

2 In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. ² (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) ³ And everyone went to their own town to register.

⁴ So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. ⁵ He went there to



register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. ⁶ While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, ⁷ and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

⁸ And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. ⁹ An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰ But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. ¹¹ Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹² This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

¹³ Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying,

¹⁴ "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests."

¹⁵ When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

¹⁶ So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. ¹⁷ When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, ¹⁸ and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. ¹⁹ But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰ The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.

²¹ On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise the child, he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him before he was conceived.
