1 Corinthians 10:23-24 states, "You say, 'I am allowed to do anything' - but not everything is good for you. You say, 'I am allowed to do anything' - but not everything is beneficial. Don't be concerned for your own good but for the good of others."

In these verses Paul states that we have freedom in Christ, but we shouldn't exercise our freedom at the cost of hurting a Christian brother or sister. We are not to consider only ourselves, we must also consider the needs and perspective of others.

I very much want to attend a Trinity worship service in the sanctuary on a Sunday morning. I would like our Sunday School children to be learning about God in their Trinity classrooms between the 8:00 and 10:00 services. I miss hearing the children sing on special Sundays. I miss handbell practice, Women's Bible Study, talking with many of you during connections time, even in-person church meetings. I miss my Trinity ladies monthly card group that hasn't met in over a year. This virus, that none of us has control over, has taken a lot from me and you.

The end to this terrible pandemic is in sight. On today's news I hear that the federal government is changing their recommendations for distribution of the Covid vaccine. The government is now recommending that all people age 65 and over and those with preexisting conditions be allowed to get the first dose of the vaccine now. They are going to stop holding the second vaccine dose for 3-4 weeks as they have been doing. Enough doses of the vaccines are being made that they are confident that dose number two will be available in 3-4 weeks when it is needed.

A doctor on the morning news program that I watch said that we need to get all available vaccines into people's arms ASAP. Once we vaccinate all people over age 65 and those with preexisting conditions that our numbers of hospitalized Covid patients will be greatly reduced. This will greatly decrease the number of Covid deaths and take the burden off hospitals. 80% of Covid deaths are people over 65 years old and those with preexisting conditions. A significant number of people who attend Sunday morning worship at Trinity fall into this age demographic. I am one of them.

The leadership team of TUMC has met frequently, weekly at times, during the Covid crisis. Gordy Zimmerman, Pastor Rom, John Muentner, Josh Marschie and I have asked you to completely change the way we are used to operating at Trinity. We have asked you to be patient for over 10 months. We know that it has been difficult. It has been difficult for us, too. If you are unhappy about our decisions, please contact one or more of us.

The Trinity staff, Jess, Priscilla and Jason, are not making the decisions. Angry phone calls to the staff will not change the situation. The staff is working especially hard and doing what the leadership team is asking them to do.

As SPRC chairperson, I ask that you hang in there just a little bit longer. Please understand that we are trying to look out for the Trinity staff. We are trying to place the health of our most vulnerable members ahead of our individual wishes. We are trying to heed Paul's directive in 1 Corinthians, "Don't be concerned for your own good but for the good of others". Then, some day very soon, we will all be able to rejoice. What a wonderful day it will be when Pastor Rom announces, "The Trinity sanctuary is open for Sunday morning worship!"

How have you been involved with Trinity's Shoebox Project? I became involved in the Shoebox Project in 2019 when I made 25 loom hats. As more people joined in making loom hats I became interested in braiding jump ropes. I finished 100+ ropes that year. When I started braiding jump ropes the Klein's and Zingsheim's brought me balls of cut-up t-shirts ready to braid. Heidi showed me how to cut up the t-shirts myself, so now they just bring me large boxes of donated t-shirts. I can now complete the project from beginning to end. In 2020 I braided over 650 jump ropes. I think that will be my record. Other things I have done are sorting colored beads for bracelets, writing notes to go into each shoebox,

Why do you choose to share your time & talents with the Shoebox Project? I have the time to do these projects and enjoy doing them. I feel like I'm making good use of my spare time. You also get to know other Shoebox Project volunteers better and develop great friendships.

Our 2020 Shoeboxes blessed children in...



Colombia



Colombia is the only country in South America to border both the Atlantic and the Pacific Oceans. Its geography ranges from snowcapped volcanoes in the Andes Mountains to beautiful beaches on the coast. Samaritan's Purse started delivering Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts to children there in 2003, and launched The Greatest Journey, our followup discipleship program for shoebox recipients, in 2009.

In this struggling neighborhood on the west side of town, it's hard to be a kid surrounded by drugs, crime, and abuse. But for a little while these youngsters smiled with joy as they joined Operation Christmas Child leaders in singing fun songs, participated in an interactive Gospel presentation complemented by colorful visuals, and ultimately opened shoeboxes brimming with gifts.

Yariana's three young children, plus three nieces and nephews, all received giftfilled shoeboxes. They came to Colombia from Venezuela almost three years ago.



Her husband crossed the border first, about three months before the rest of his family. He came because the economic crisis had destroyed his welding business. He had no clients—no one could afford such services—and it was impossible to get supplies anyway. When he left the family behind, they all cried, and discussing that day still bring tears to Yariana's eyes.

Yariana and the children were able to soon join him, though, and despite many challenges, life is better in their new home. "In Colombia, he's been able to find work and sustain the family," she said.

She was grateful for the shoebox event and thankful it "brought a lot of happiness" to her children.

This unit was purchased with grant money received from Ziegler, the firm Heidi Zingsheim is employed by, thru a philanthropy program opportunity in past years. Jerry Klein assembled the unit as well as donated some accessories... Thank you!

This drop-box was purchased with the Trinity Shoebox Project and other mission outreach activity in mind but was donated to the church to be utilized by **EVERYONE**. Discussing the Shoebox Project finances is not a comfortable topic for us but a necessary one. Fundraising and personal donations the last two years have been covering only a percentage of shoebox content expenses (hygiene, school supplies, articles of clothing, fun items, etc), but in order to continue partnering with Samaritan's Purse in good faith we need to put forth our best effort to cover all our expenses, including the shipping obligation.
