Turn to page 334 in Our Great Redeemer's Praise and let the last verse

Annual Conference Report

Dear Trinity Congregation,

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to join Pastor Mulongo at the Annual Conference of the Great Lakes Global Methodist Church. Pastor Mulongo's cousin, Esther Somp, a third year seminary student at Drew University, joined us in Spring Arbor, Michigan for the three day conference. Over 700 Global Methodists from Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan participated in the conference. The three of us praised our Lord Jesus Christ with uplifting music, inspirational prayer, many learning opportunities, and fellowship with other like minded Christians. What an experience!

The conference was led by Rev. Dr. Scott Pattison, our conference superintendent. The theme for the conference was EQUIP, based on Ephesians 4:11-13. "Now these are the gifts Christ gave to the church: the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, and the pastors and teachers. Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ. This will continue until we all come to such unity in our faith and knowledge of God's Son that we will be mature in the Lord, measuring up to the full and complete standard of Christ." At the end of the conference, Bishop Mark Webb ordained over 40 new clergy into the Global Methodist Church. We left the conference with information and resources to help EQUIP Trinity Methodist Church for our mission of loving, growing, and serving our God and our community.



Take a look at the video screen. Does anyone know what this acronym stands for? (Pause and look around) IYKDWYBDYKGWYBG

It stands for, "If you keep doing what you've been doing. You'll keep getting what you've been getting." Basically, if Trinity Methodist Church wants to get something different, we need to start a new life cycle. Pastor Mulongo and our church leaders are tasked with building our community of God into what God intends Trinity to be. God promises to bring us the gifts that we need to help Trinity grow. But we must do the legwork and build the church that He wants us to build, not the church that we want to build. Rev. Dr. Sam Rainer from "Church Answers" presented us with results of research on church trends. Here are some important statistics from his research. Right now 80% of churches are plateauing or declining. The median church size today is 65 weekly attendees. In 2000 it was more than double that at 137 weekly attendees. A typical church will lose 20% of it's attendance every year. As an example, take a church with a weekly attendance of 100 people. Research shows that churches will lose people at these percentages for these reasons:

- Death -1
- Moving -9
- Transfer -5
- Lack of frequency in attendance 5-10

According to Rev. Rainer, no church should die, if God can save any person he can save any church. Every church can grow. A church will grow in attendance in these ways. Listed in order of importance:

- Conversion growth a brand new believer
- Biological growth children born or adopted into a home
- Demographic growth a new resident to the community who is already a Christian
- Transfer growth existing resident moves from one church to another

Only 1% of churches have an ongoing emphasis on evangelism. Evangelism is described as the act of proclaiming the Gospel, or good news of Jesus Christ with the aim of persuading others to believe in Him and receive salvation. In Pastor Mulongo's sermon last week he stated that people around us are desperate for hope. People need to hear my story of how God has transformed my life, how God has given me everything that I have. We want our family and acquaintances to know the saving grace of God. Rev. Rainier offers these recommendations as to how we can be the feet of God and bring people to Jesus Christ:

- 1. Inviting people to Trinity is more important than actually getting those people to walk into our building.
- 2. The church leadership should work with members who are willing to help grow the church.
- 3. Churches should raise the bar of expectations. We should expect our members to attend every Sunday worship service unless they are ill or out of town.
- 4. We can win people with outstanding hospitality.
- 5. Children and youth ministry budgets should be large. Attracting young people and keeping them at Trinity should be a top priority.

I attended two break out sessions on discipleship. Allow me to highlight a few points from those sessions. A disciple is someone who loves Jesus, obeys Jesus, and works to bring other's to Jesus; an apprentice to Jesus, if you will. An observer should notice that a disciple engages their world differently than a non-believer. Discipleship is not just about having information. It's about our behaviors. Discipleship is not just about education. It is about a personal transformation. Small group studies are a proven Wesleyan way to grow disciples. The Great Lakes GMC has partnered with The River Network. The River Network has devised a simple Discovery Bible Study Guide to use as a template for small group studies. I look forward to presenting more detail on Discovery Bible Studies in the near future.

To wrap up this report, if you want more details about Annual Conference and the legislation that was voted upon you can go to greatlakesgmc.org. It was just announced that Annual Conference 2026 will be held June 10-12 in Green Lake, WI. Any member of our church can attend Annual Conference as a non-voting member. With next year's conference being held less than an hour away it would be a great opportunity to learn from and fellowship with other Global Methodists from the Great Lakes Conference.



TMC Church Tower Project

The Church Tower Project is well under way. Work began on June 17, 2025. As you remember, votes were taken at an All Church Meeting on May 11 and the following work was agreed upon by the congregation:

- The tower will be lowered 10 to 12 feet until a good brick veneer is reached. The remaining portion will be repaired as needed and the cross will be reattached.
- Update: The church tower had to be lowered another two feet as Capelle Bros. and Diedrich were unable to salvage enough useable brick for the restoration of the remaining tower.
- Cost will be \$49,880.00
- Lights will be readdressed by Trustees when needed (lights currently not operational)
- Project will take approximately one month to complete
- Payment will be addressed by the Admin Board and Financial Committee.



Your Faith Journey - The College Years

I was so inspired reading the college scholarship applications, that I reached out to a few of the applicants to see if they'd be ok with my using part of their essays in the Newsletter to highlight their faith journeys. Over the next few months, you'll be impressed by the deep faith these young adults have gained and how they are using this faith to guide their lives.

This month's highlights: Nate Dewhurst



When I was younger I rarely picked up my Bible outside of church, but that all changed after leaving for college. There are lots of people in the world and many of them have different beliefs than I do. Even amongst Christians there are differences in beliefs, so I wanted to have a solid understanding of what I actually believed, and why I believed them. This led to me reading my bible much more often and the deeper I dove into God's word, the more intrigued I became. Reading the Bible firsthand instead of listening to the words come out of someone else's mouth allowed me to focus on the sections that caught my attention and reread passages that at first didn't make sense. As I read more books from the Bible, I found myself wanting to read even more of them. One specific book from the Bible that I feel changed my life more than any of the others was Ecclesiastes. If you are unfamiliar with this book, it is a book of wisdom where the author tries to find the purpose of life, but instead realizes that most things in this world are actually quite meaningless. He finds that

acquiring more wisdom only makes him more worried for society, obtaining more wealth does not bring

him a more fulfilling life, and that indulging in alcohol and partying does not make his life any more satisfying in the long run. He realizes that every person on this planet will one day die, and most of them will be completely forgotten about soon afterwards. This brings the realization that the only source of eternal love and joy comes from heaven, and so that is what we should dedicate our Earthly lives to. Serving God and choosing to live our lives with Him while we are here in this world, to ensure that we will be with him for eternity. This realization was revolutionary to my life, as I often found myself in a similar situation to the author. I often spent so much time worrying about earthly things such as my grades and what people thought about me, that I would lose sight of what really mattered in life. Once I realized that the things I once thought defined were only temporary, I started dedicating more time to God, and have discovered that the more I give my life to Him, the more satisfied I am with my own life.

We're not done updating our equipment and sound system yet, so please consider making a donation if you haven't already.




